INSTRUCTION

The course is given in English. The course is designed with five research oriented seminars. To three of these seminars the doctoral student writes a short assignment related to the literature. The course ends with one short paper (essay) around the course content.

ASSESSMENT

Active participation during seminars and writing of papers: three short papers and one final essay. All seminars are mandatory. All activities (seminars and papers) are in English.

If there are special reasons for doing so, an examiner may make an exception from the method of assessment indicated and allow a student to be assessed by another method. An example of special reasons might be a certificate regarding special pedagogical support from the University's disability coordinator.
